It was signed in 1935 at the Oval Office – the first international treaty to be signed there – and India became one of the first nations to support Roerich's appeal for the necessity of protection and preservation of culture.

And so, it was in Kullu, amidst the embrace of the majestic Himalayas, that the life and legacy of Nicholas Roerich came to symbolize the collective dedication of India and Russia to safeguarding the richness of our shared human heritage.

In the decades that have followed, the torch of cultural preservation has continued to burn in the hearts of both our nations. India and Russia have nurtured a time-tested friendship that has seen remarkable milestones – whether in the form of strategic alliances in the fields of defence and technology to collaborations in space exploration.

Our shared vision for the future includes not only the preservation of our cultural heritage but also a dedication to building a better world for all.
